Using these points as a base it defends the French Revolution against Edmund Burke's attack in Reflections on the Revolution in France (1790).

Thomas Paine's most famous work, The Rights of Man was published in 1791, two years after the French Revolution. In it he defended the values of the Revolution - those of "Liberté, égalité, fraternité" (the French for "liberty, equality and brotherhood"). Paine explored the idea that government based on true justice should support not only mankind's natural rights (life, liberty, free speech, freedom of conscience) but also its civil rights (relating to security and protection).

When Burke replied, Paine came back with Rights of Man, Part II, published on February 17, 1792. What began as a defense of the French Revolution evolved into an analysis of the basic reasons for discontent in European society and a remedy for the evils of arbitrary government, poverty, illiteracy, unemployment, and war.

Paine's Rights of Man goes on to outline a low view of hereditary forms of government. One of the main philosophical features of Rights is that it disagrees with Burke's Reflections on the point of aristocracy. Burke argued that whenever the uneducated masses are governed by a higher caste, like an oligarchy or an aristocracy.
